Rob Doggett

Rob Doggett is Professor of English at SUNY Geneseo. He has published widely on Yeats and currently serves as the general editor of the Journal of International Yeats Studies.

Lucy Collins

Lucy Collins is Associate Professor of Modern Poetry at University College Dublin. Her books include Contemporary Irish Women Poets: Memory and Estrangement. She is co-founder of the Irish Poetry Reading Archive, a national digital repository.

Zsuzsanna Balázs

Zsuzsanna Balázs is Assistant Professor at Óbuda University in Budapest, Hungary. She obtained her PhD in Drama and Theatre at the University of Galway. Her first monograph is titled Queering W. B. Yeats and Gabriele D'Annunzio: Modernist Playwrights (Palgrave Macmillan, 2023).

Fran Brearton

Fran Brearton is Professor of Modern Poetry at Queen's University Belfast and a member of the Royal Irish Academy. Her books include The Great War in Irish Poetry, Reading Michael Longley, and, as editor, The Oxford Handbook of Modern Irish Poetry (with Alan Gillis).

Melinda Szuts

Melinda Szuts is a director and lecturer in drama and theatre studies. She lectures on the history of drama and theatre, directing and dramaturgy. Her fields of research are physical theatre, theories of space and place, and applied space dramaturgy. She has directed many of W. B. Yeats's dance plays.

Angela Griffith

Angela Griffith is Principal Investigator for The Cuala Press Project, Schooner Foundation (2022-26) and is Assistant Professor with the Department of the History of Art and Architecture, Trinity College Dublin. Her current research explores the artistry and agency of the printed image in modern and contemporary Irish art..

Vona Groarke

Vona Groarke has published fourteen books, most recently Woman of Winter (Gallery Books, 2023), and Hereafter: The Telling Life of Ellen O'Hara (New York University Press, 2022). She is the current Writer in Residence at St John's College, Cambridge.

Wit Pietrzak

Wit Pietrzak is Professor of British and Irish Literature in the Institute of English Studies, University of Łódź. He specializes in modernist and neo-modernist Irish and British poetry. His most recent book is Constitutions of Self in Contemporary Irish Poetry: 'Into the Light'..

Jack Quin

Jack Quin is Assistant Professor in English at Dublin City University. He has published articles on various aspects of Yeats, Irish poetry and the relationship between poetry and the visual arts. He is the author of W. B. Yeats and the Language of Sculpture (OUP, 2022).

Paige Reynolds

Paige Reynolds is Professor of English at the College of the Holy Cross in Worcester, Massachusetts. She has published widely on modernism and Irish writing, and her books include Modernism in Irish Women's Contemporary Writing: The Stubborn Mode (2024) and the Cambridge edited volume, The New Irish Studies (2020)
